Ulrichsweb.com

- This online resource provides information on over 300,000 periodicals, including scholarly and academic journals, peer reviewed titles, popular literature, news sources and e-journals
- There may be connections from Ulrichsweb to UIUC catalog entries as well, so viewers can move from researching a journal to obtaining the articles.
- This is a UIUC user resource, accessible anywhere on campus or with UIUC NetID

 - Ulrichs offers simple and clean interface. Enter the journal's name.
 - The legend offers icons to indicate:

TOC (Table of Contents), Refereed, Electronic only, Open Access and Reviewed

The referee symbol indicates a refereed journal (See the yellow highlighted areas in the graphic above; for Ulrich a refereed journal means refereed or peer-reviewed).

Once in a record for a journal, there are several toggles to explore various aspects of the journal.

NOTE: Other resources such as EBSCO and many of the interfaces allow users to select peer review as a facet.



Another option is to look at the masthead, editorial statement, instructions for authors or submission guideline pages. Oftentimes, there is an indication that the journal is peer-reviewed.
