Institute Summary

In this six-week professional development program in public management and leadership, we will explore the current literature and practice of civil/human rights; water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) engineering; health/public health/medicine; public works (utilities/water/waste management); and women's and girls' issues. Our framework considers the ways nation, race, class, gender, sexuality, and globalization intersect to impact the experiences and agency of end users.

Within the social sciences and civil and environmental engineering today, we realize that our understanding of society generally and appropriate technologies is merely partial. This is moreover the case in regards to our understandings of gender and health and appropriate water and sanitation technologies. While we have a desire to better understand and better promote social justice and adaptable technologies, we realize that the only way to do this would be to partner with stakeholders and work in concert to make positive contributions, in terms of gender, health, and technology. Connecting to 25 young African leaders during the six weeks of the Mandela Washington Fellowship provides a unique opportunity for free flowing conversations about the challenges of public management in the U.S. and in African countries, and ways we might arrive at collective solutions for common problems.

Learning Objectives and Goals

- Develop an understanding of cutting edge technologies to improve public management and public sector accountability
- Gain exposure to questions of public finance, rule of law, education, public health, environment, and foreign policy
- Increase knowledge of the complex relationship among race, class, gender, sexuality, disability, age, globalization, and public management
- Gather insight into the operations of public management in the U.S.
- Elaborate collaborative, innovative, and practical plans to become active in public management in participants' communities
- Gain exposure to sociological scientific methods of inquiry and writing
- Use basic statistical analysis to examine results of public management

Institute Structure:

Seminar participation is an integral part of the learning experience for this course. Every week we will address a new theme concerning public management. On Mondays, we will typically discuss the theme for the week and then engage in hands-on activities that reinforce the theme. On Tuesdays and Thursdays we will have lab sessions from 10:30-noon.. Mandela Washington Fellows will work in groups to prepare a presentation on some aspect of public management in their countries. Fellows will also work to prepare hands-on presentations in the community, especially to youth camps. And in the afternoons (M/T/W), invited speakers will discuss aspects of the theme for the week via an interactive presentation. Thursday mornings will be set aside for Presidential Summit Preparation and afternoons will be reserved for time with peer collaborators. Time will also be reserved for community service, cultural activities, and site visits. Saturdays will be community engagement days and we will take a weekly trip to the Urbana Farmer's Market. Sundays are reserved for rest and relaxation and reading to prepare for the new week.

Journal Work

Part 1: Seminar and Leadership Session Experiences—Participants should write short entries discussing their reactions to classroom experiences. These can be insights stimulated by classroom discussion, lecture, and group work.

Part 2: Daily readings—Participants should write 2-page journal entries that demonstrate that they have read the material assigned for class. These are informal. However, a brief summary of the readings and their relationship to the Fellow’s research project and possibly other issues discussed in class should be included.

Mandela-Washington Fellows must type all of these entries. *Label each journal entry with the date due, week’s theme, and the title of the appropriate reading(s) for the day.* Fellows should keep the journal entries in a folder for a potential final collection the last day of class.

Length: Part 1 should be at least $\frac{3}{4}$ page and part 2 should be *at least* 2 pages. Remember that this is one way to tell me whether you have completed the required readings and have thought about the issues raised by the authors. Please DO NOT COPY material from the readings. This is a violation of academic integrity. (See below.)

Feedback on Journals: Journals will be collected once a week throughout the course. Expectations include clarity, ingenuity, and rich content. Typically, Parts 1 & 2 will be collected at the beginning of lab on Thursdays. Part 1 may be used for your own observations. These journals will not be graded.

Other Program Elements

Networking and Peer Collaboration: Program Fellows will be matched with Peer Collaborators, professionals from public and private organizations in the Champaign-Urbana community.

Seminars and Panel Discussions: Lectures and panel discussions by UIUC faculty and notable external speakers (all experts in their field) from the community and the region will explore the theme of Public Management as a topic for discussion and analysis. Our approach is thematic, with workshops and experiential learning structured to reinforce the theory and content of seminar sessions.

Workshops: These will reinforce the panels, seminars, and speaker series, providing Fellows with techniques, skills, approaches, and methodologies and an opportunity to practice implementation.



Films: Periodic film and documentary screenings (accompanied by discussion) will complement readings and program activities. Films provide examples of how the notions introduced in seminars and workshops are experienced in American popular culture.

Site visits: These also reinforce the panels and seminars speaker series, but go a step further than workshops by giving Fellows an opportunity to try out new skills or experience learned materials in a real setting.

Day Trips: There will be three day trips to Springfield, IL, Danville, IL, and Indianapolis, IN. where Fellows will explore themes, engage in community service, and participate in cultural activities linked to specific themes in the program.

Public Management Presentations: These are individual Fellow presentations on their home country, communities, and culture as well as professional and lived experiences.

De-brief Sessions: These are informal sessions with program staff, usually over lunch, during which Fellows can discuss the program, provide feedback about academic or administrative concerns, provide their reactions to American culture, and ask any questions. At least one is scheduled per week of the program.

Community Service: Such activities give Fellows the opportunity to interact with the community and experience in-action, program implementation. Sharing labor with American peers provides Fellows with an up-close and personal view of what drives and motivates public management leaders.

Week 1: Orientation and Defining Problems

Overview: To understand public management issues, it is important to consider the contributions of interpretive and feminist analysis. This perspective will unveil inequities in the distribution of these resources as well as to paint a multilayered picture of the lives of those affected by public management resources. In this institute, we will work with you to explore public management in various U.S. institutions. We will develop a framework that considers the ways that industry, neoliberalism, gender, class, race/ethnicity, globalization, and other dimensions of oppression intersect to impact upon the experiences and agency of families. We will also examine recent nationally representative data reports to provide for evidence-based perspectives.

Rep. Carol Ammons will discuss new legislation (House Bill 1326) that was passed last year to safeguard drinking water from pollution. She will share how she went about garnering support for this legislation and what it took to pass it. Ammons will share how she involved the community in raising awareness of the issue. According to Ammons, "The Mahomet Aquifer serves as Champaign-Urbana's lifeline for clean, safe water that is used for everything from drinking to commerce. . . . It has been an enriching experience to work with legislators and organizations on all sides of the issue to pass a bipartisan measure that helps safeguard our region's most valuable natural resource from contamination." Ammons worked to pass House Bill 1326, which prohibits the disposal of manufactured gas plant waste in a municipal solid waste landfill that could leach toxins into groundwater sources, such as the Mahomet Aquifer. Earlier this year, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) designated the

Mahomet Aquifer as the provider of drinking water for Central Illinois. This sole source designation allows the EPA to review federally funded projects in the vicinity to ensure drinking water will not be contaminated. “This legislation serves as a major victory for our entire community, but our work is not done,” Ammons said. “We must continue to encourage discussions on how we can better protect our natural resources, such as the Mahomet Aquifer, from pollution in order to ensure they are preserved for future generations to enjoy.” House Bill 1326, now Public Act 99-0365, was signed into law on Friday and went into effect on Jan. 1, 2016.

Speaker: Joanna Shisler, Prof. The School of Molecular and Cellular Biology, UIUC

Professor Shisler will address how to detect and disinfect viruses from water, and also her work on understanding the microbiome of a community water supply over time, and how this microbiome changes in response to climate change and human behaviors. The goal of Shisler's laboratory is to use trans-disciplinary approaches to ask fundamental question about virology: What are the molecular properties of viruses that make them resistant or susceptible to disinfection in natural settings versus hospitals or water treatment plants? How do viruses evade the immune system to cause disease? How can we engineer new methods to detect infectious viruses in clinical and environmental samples? How do viruses inhibit the immune response to their benefit? We will discuss what is the relevance for public management while touring the Urbana Champaign Sanitary District.

Week 2: Context & Specifics: Analyzing Public Management and Health Data, Wastewater treatment, Turning Waste water into energy, and Citizenship and Grassroots Involvement

Overview: During this week we begin to examine the intricacies of very fixable problems concerning public management, including access to water and sanitation. Engineers, development specialists, humanitarians, many of whom sincerely wish to offer acceptable and appropriate solutions to issues such as water and sanitation, offer technological know-how, but can benefit from social science contributions to how to create bottom-up solutions that will not inadvertently reproduce inequality. We will further introduce the social justice framework that will motivate our research, appreciative inquiry, and actions plans to be developed during the institute. We will collectively explore the health settings of marginalized groups in the U.S. Further we will do some Team Building work, and discuss Citizenship and Grassroots involvement. We will end the week by attending a conference on public management of educational resources.

Seminar: New Public Management (NPM) and how it obscures the old colonial strategies of management. This seminar will critically assess the principles of NPM and how its adoption by public policies has been detrimental to the livelihood of the poor and their basic needs and sanitation. If time permitted we will make connections between such policies of privatization and neoliberalization and the increasing outmigration by educated Africans to Europe or the US. One example of African migration to the Midwest and Illinois will be discussed in the seminar followed up by group discussion and participants' reflection on how they face such challenges in their own professional work.

Faranak Miraftab is Professor of Urban and Regional Planning at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. She is author of *Global Heartland: Displaced Labor, Transnational Lives and Local Placemaking*, (published January 2016); and *Women's Empowerment: Participation in Shelter Strategies at the Community Level in Urban Informal Settlements* (published 1996 by the UN Center for Human Settlements). Conduct Appreciative Inquiry of Public Management Issue (Group Project)

Appreciative Inquiry is about the co-evolutionary search for the best in people, their organizations, and the relevant world around them. In its broadest focus, it involves systematic discovery of what gives “life” to a living system when it is most alive, most effective, and most constructively capable in economic, ecological, and human terms. AI involves, in a central way, the art and practice of asking questions that strengthen a system’s capacity to apprehend, anticipate, and heighten positive potential. It centrally involves the mobilization of inquiry through the crafting of the “unconditional positive question” often-involving hundreds or sometimes thousands of people. In AI the arduous task of intervention gives way to the speed of imagination and innovation; instead of negation, criticism, and spiraling diagnosis, there is discovery, dream, and design. AI seeks, fundamentally, to build a constructive union between a whole people and the massive entirety of what people talk about as past and present capacities: achievements, assets, unexplored potentials, innovations, strengths, elevated thoughts, opportunities, benchmarks, high point moments, lived values, traditions, strategic competencies, stories, expressions of wisdom, insights into the deeper corporate spirit or soul– and visions of valued and possible futures. Taking all of these together as a gestalt, AI deliberately, in everything it does, seeks to work from accounts of this “positive change core”—and it assumes that every living system has many untapped and rich and inspiring accounts of the positive. Link the energy of this core directly to any change agenda and changes never thought possible are suddenly and democratically mobilized. We will work in groups to conduct an appreciative inquiry of some aspect of public management.

Professor Garcia will provide a presentation and tour of the Ven Te Chow Hydrosystems Laboratory, an [11,000 square-foot hydraulic research laboratory](#) at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, part of the top-ranked [Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering](#). The Laboratory is named in honor of its founder, [Professor Ven Te Chow](#). The Hydrosystems Laboratory will be expanded and modernized over the next two years in a \$12 million project supported by the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering, the College of Engineering and the campus.

The Hydro Lab was recently expanded as a phase of the larger Civil and Environmental Engineering Infrastructure Modernization Plan, which will include developing resources and support for the renovation and expansion of Newmark Civil Engineering Laboratory as well, over the next three to five years. In this first phase, one to two floors will be added to the Hydrosystems Lab, the footprint will be enlarged and the building will be made compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The newly created space will include laboratories to support modern instructional methods that focus on hands-on learning, as well as additional classrooms and office space.

Completed in 1967, the Hydro Lab has been the home of the department's Environmental Hydrology and Hydraulic Engineering area. It features a large, central experimental bay for hydrological research, as well as additional labs,

classrooms and offices. The renovations will create space for use by all CEE areas, including areas designed for cross-disciplinary collaboration.

“We created the cross-cutting programs, and now we need to provide the infrastructure, the modernized space, that will allow the faculty to implement this vision for our students,” said Professor [Benito Mariñas](#), Interim Department Head and Ivan Racheff Professor of Environmental Engineering.

Professor [Marcelo García](#) is leading the committee that will plan the redesign. García is director of the Ven Te Chow Hydrosystems Laboratory and the M.T. Geoffrey Yeh Endowed Chair in Civil and Environmental Engineering.

“We have these classes that have a lot of design content, but we don’t have a lot of design space,” García said. “We want to afford the students more hands-on experience. Right now, my feeling is that between the crane bay in Newmark and the crane bay over in Hydro, students probably feel a lot more like spectators of the whole scene. We want to get them more involved, to use more of the lab and to do more things.”

The longer term plan to modernize CEE’s campus buildings stems from a desire to ensure that the department’s facilities support emerging innovative instructional methods being introduced by the faculty, said Professor [Liang Liu](#), CEE Associate Head and Director of Undergraduate Studies.

“We have a lot of new ideas, new ways of teaching our students,” Liu said. “We need to ask ourselves, ‘What will the new facilities be that can cater to the new pedagogies, the new ideas? What are the spaces that will be needed?’”

The design of the renovated Hydro lab was recently completed spring 2016.

The project is one of [six facility projects](#) totaling \$23 million within the College of Engineering that are being funded by the departments, the college and the campus matching funds program. We will discuss principles and techniques of program evaluation. Program evaluation is a systematic method for collecting, analyzing, and using information to answer questions about projects, policies and [programs](#), particularly about their effectiveness and efficiency. In both the public and private sectors, stakeholders often want to know whether the programs they are funding, implementing, voting for, receiving or objecting to are producing the intended effect. While *program evaluation* first focuses around this definition, important considerations often include how much the program costs per participant, how the program could be improved, whether the program is worthwhile, whether there are better alternatives, if there are *unintended* outcomes, and whether the program goals are appropriate and useful. Evaluators help to answer these questions, but the best way to answer the questions is for the evaluation to be a joint project between evaluators and stakeholders.

9am-noon	Seminar, Mahomet Aquifer Speaker: Mr. George Wissmiller will describe the Aquifer and talk about the continuing effort to protect it. With Q&A, video, and PowerPoint we will discuss this important resource.
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The Mahomet aquifer is the major groundwater resource for east-central Illinois. Many communities, industries, and irrigators depend on the aquifer for their supply; withdrawals in 1995 for municipal use are estimated at over 30 mgd. Withdrawals for irrigation, principally in Mason and Tazewell Counties (the Havana Lowlands area), puts usage well over 100 mgd.

Mr. Wissmiller will provide "a narrated slide show presentation of the history and current status of the toxic landfill at Clinton Landfill over the Mahomet Sole Source Aquifer stressing the interplay of various governmental agencies, individuals, activist, and the public in this 10 year old and still unresolved issue. I will be using the framework of this issue to discuss the various ways issues like this are and can be addressed both positively and negatively by various entities at various levels from the individual member of the public to the federal government. I hope for lots of questions."

George Wissmiller is a retired 25-year veteran Champaign City Police Officer. Prior to holding that position, he worked in the US Army Military Police prison at Fort Ord, California. He was an instructor at the U of I Police Training Institute and is a National

Safety Council instructor. He ran unsuccessfully for the Illinois State House of representatives in 2008 and successfully for the DeWitt County Board in 2012. He won that election as an independent—neither a Republican nor a Democrat. He has been involved in the effort to protect the Mahomet Sole Source Aquifer from the toxic dumping at the Clinton Landfill directly over it for about nine years. He is currently vice president of WATCH (an environmental activist group) and member of several other groups with similar concerns. He also serves on Representative Ammons’s Criminal Justice and Environmental committees.

WHO: A Fellow speaker selected by each Institute

WHAT: 3 to 5 minute presentations at the Presidential Summit

WHY: To highlight the work Fellows are doing or plan to do in their home countries

WHEN: Ignite Talks will take place on August 1-2, 2016 at the Presidential Summit

The 2016 Presidential Summit will include a series of Ignite Talks sessions where 6-7 Fellows, one from each MWF Institute, will present in a TED Talk-style format for three to five minutes.

For these sessions Fellows will be grouped by track, with the Energy Institute joining the public management track. Fellows may choose to use slide decks, but it is optional.

The overarching theme for year's Ignite Talks is "Equality, Ethics, and Opportunity"; and Fellows can choose to develop their presentation around the thematic area, which provides the most relevant framework for sharing their experience. The selected topical areas are purposefully broad to allow Fellows the opportunity to speak about their own ideas as they relate to the overall concept.

The Ignite Talks provide a platform for Fellows to share their ideas, projects, and plans. Each speaker is given five minutes and after all speakers have presented there will be a facilitated dialogue with the audience. The talks should "ignite" questions and lively conversation amongst the group. This is a unique opportunity for Fellows to present to each other as well as representatives from the White House, State Department, USAID, and other invited guests. It is also an excellent leadership development activity, which ideally will complement the leadership program Institutes have planned for the Fellows.

Fellows can use one of the thematic areas for inspiration but should be empowered to be creative in what and how they present. For example, Fellows might choose to discuss the work that they are doing in their home countries, future endeavors, how their work or idea addresses a challenge in their home country or Africa as a whole, or how the Institute inspired a change in their plans.

Please note these are only ideas. We do want to stress that the Ignite Talks are individual projects – each Fellow's Ignite Talk should reflect his or her own thoughts, background, or interests rather than representing their institute cohort of 25. Past talks have been most well received when they focus on innovative solutions to specific challenges and showcase a Fellow's personal passion and vision. In the past, some Institutes have encouraged Fellows to use the development of their Ignite Talk as a strategic opportunity to create and hone a pitch presentation, which can be further utilized and built upon once they have returned home. Each Institute is responsible for selecting one Fellow to present his/her Ignite talk at the Presidential Summit. While we encourage Institutes to implement a selection process, which is built on consensus and allows all Fellows the opportunity to undertake the process of creating an Ignite Talk, it is up to Partners as to how they want to best manage selection of their Fellow speaker. Institutes will need to confirm the name of the selected Fellow presenter to their IREX track contact by Wednesday, July 13th. Host institutes should reserve the last two weeks of summit preparation time in their schedules for other Summit related requests that arise.
