


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Topic Mapping -> Keyword Brainstorm





Primary Sources

- Novels, short stories, poems that you analyze
- Newspaper clippings of current events related to the author or novels' topics
- Pamphlets, treatises, legal writings, and other historical documents from the period



Types of Secondary Sources

- Reference works (online and print): encyclopedias, dictionaries, bibliographies
- Journal articles
- Books (a.k.a. monographs)

Types of secondary literature

- Reference: basic overviews and facts
- Theoretical: critical theory and philosophy, can be applied to multiple genres, periods
- Criticism: literary analysis usually specific to a text(s), author, movement
- Historical: Historical criticism and analysis, provides facts and analysis about a time period or movement
