#### WHAT MAKES A LIBRARY?

• A **library** is a curated collection of sources of information and similar resources, selected by experts and made accessible to a defined community for reference or borrowing. It provides physical or digital access to material, and may be a physical location or a virtual space, or both.

#### WHAT MAKES A LIBRARY?

• "A library is a collection of resources in a variety of formats that is (1) organized by information professionals or other experts who (2) provide convenient physical, digital, bibliographic, or intellectual access and (3) offer targeted services and programs (4) with the mission of educating, informing, or entertaining a variety of audiences (5) and the goal of stimulating individual learning and advancing society as a whole." (p.1) The Librarian's Book of Lists (Chicago:ALA, 2010)

#### WHAT MAKES A LIBRARIAN?

"Librarians typically need a master's degree in library science. Some positions have additional requirements, such as a teaching certificate or a degree in another field."
